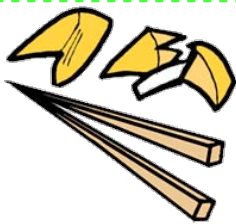

Our project this year will be the creation of Self-Stick Window Clings that will allow patients the chance to select their own artwork for viewing while they are staying at Gillette for treatment. Removable, reusable, easily maintained and stored these are sure to be a huge hit with patients and Gillette staff alike. In addition we hope to create Temporary Tattoos of the finished works that the Gillette Staff will be able to hand out to patients and visitors thus promoting CHAI all year long.

We excitedly look forward to some fabulous CHAI sessions and some amazing experiences ahead for our Gillette Artists & NCJW, St. Paul Section CHAI Volunteers. We hope that you will share in our Growth and join us for one or more of this year's CHAI Sessions.

## Girls On The Move

NCJW St. Paul's newest community service project is off to an exciting second year!

Girls on the Move is a six-week curriculum taught to third and fourth grade girls. It was developed to help young girls learn the skills for developing a healthy body image and positive self-esteem, while providing tools to help empower girls and motivate them towards success.

The curriculum combines yoga classes and teacher lead discussions with topics that include "Friendship Struggles," "Our Many Roles and Identities," "Teasing Tales" and "Wishing Star Mobile." Girls on the Move has been extremely popular and NCJW has



received very positive feedback from the students. This class was successfully taught at Expo Elementary school this past spring. Currently, the class is being taught at the Talmud Torah Day School, as an after school program.

## NCJW St. Paul Section Embarks on New Fundraiser

The NCJW St. Paul Section is embarking on a new method of fundraising. The key to our section's viability is the passionate and generous support of our members. In order to pay for local programs such as Children's Healing Arts Initiative (CHAI), Girls on the Move, national programs such as Benchmark: Campaign to save Roe, Yad B'Yad grants in Israel and to fund new programs, we must work to attain financial security.

We are offering our members and corporate sponsors the opportunity to support NCJW with three new levels of giving. Within each level, there are wonderful benefits and the opportunity to show that you are proud to be a member of NCJW and that you want the wonderful work of NCJW to continue.

## NCJW Legislative Positions

### Help End Human Trafficking

The "End Demand for Sex Trafficking Act" has been introduced into Congress. This legislation targets the demand for sex trafficking, particularly as it impacts children, by increasing resources for the prosecution of traffickers and those that purchase their services. It also includes provisions to assist the trafficking victims. More congressional support is needed to ensure this legislation is passed. ### The Supreme Court Hears Two Abortion Rights Cases

The outcome of the two latest Supreme Court Cases, Ayotte and Scheidler, could undermine a woman's constitutional right to reproductive freedom. The first, Ayotte, concerns required parental notification for the termination of a teenage pregnancy, even in cases of medical emergency. The outcome of this case will affect all women as it will determine whether an individual woman must suffer harm before an abortion restriction can be challenged. The second, Scheidler, would condone the intimidation and harassment of women at clinic entrances. Even women seeking other services at a clinic that provides abortions will risk violence to receive necessary medical care.

Action Alerts are emails that inform you when important contact is needed to a policy maker. They are quick and simple and provide critical feedback to our elected officials. Most Action Alerts give the reader some background information and a specific action to take. Often the action is as simple as following a link to send a message to the target official. Most actions take only a few minutes at most. If you don't have time to respond to a particular Action Alert, don't worry. Just respond when you are able and to those that you choose. ## Join Us For A Knit-In

We will be gathering for a Knit-in on **January 12 from 12:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the Capitol Rotunda**. This coincides with the scheduled confirmation hearings of Judge Samuel Alito for the Supreme Court. We will be knitting scarves to donate, but more importantly, we will publicly oppose the confirmation of Alito. If confirmed, his known position on Roe could spell the end to women's reproductive rights.

Everyone will have an opportunity to send our Senators letters opposing Alito's confirmation. We plan to have press coverage of this event and encourage all NCJW members (those knitting and those not) and their family and friends to join us for this important event. ## Mental Health Project

*Sheltering Our Souls* was the theme of the fifth annual fall conference sponsored by the Mental Health Education Project, a collaborative program of the Twin Cities Jewish community. The conference took place Sunday, October 23, during Sukkot, and in the spirit of the holiday brought shelter and comfort to all who came.

More than 300 people heard an inspiring keynote talk by Sandy Naiman, a successful Toronto journalist and radio personality, who has lived with a serious mental illness for most of her life. Sandy also facilitated a breakout group discussion about disclosure in social situations and in the workplace. Participants attending the session called *What Should I Say?* shared ideas about when and how to talk about living and thriving despite a mental illness.

Other breakout group sessions covered a range of topics and age groups. Rabbi Morris Allen of Beth Jacob facilitated a session called *Wandering in the Wilderness*, which explored the conference theme through text study and discussion.

The day ended with a brief but beautiful healing service with a D'var Torah by Rabbi Amy Eilberg. Cantor Audrey Abrams of Beth El, conducted the service and also played guitar and flute.

As in previous years, reactions to the conference as a whole were overwhelmingly positive. Attendees especially appreciated the comfortable atmosphere, the openness and sharing, the quality and responsiveness of presenters, and the delicious lunch buffet.

The St. Paul Section is one of the Mental Health Education Project's Collaborating Partners. Beth Gendler represents the section on the steering committee and many St. Paul Section members are active volunteers with the project.
